
PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE


School Learning Plans


Each year, schools develop their School Learning Plans where they set whole school improvement priorities which are enacted by staff and students. Improvement is informed by evidence of learner achievement and progress and whole school data analysis. Our school's approach to improvement is underpinned by high expectations for learner progress and levels of student engagement and wellbeing. This year, we will again have a focus on developing writing and mathematics with our students. We also add to these priorities the target of developing STEM (Science Technology Engineering and Maths) in the school with staff training and different learning opportunities for students. This includes our students in years 5/6 taking part in the Beacon project, a virtual reality program, during Term 1 and our Year 2/3/4 students participating in a quantum physics STEM project led by staff from STEM Australia and class teachers in Term 2. Teachers are developing integrated programs in classrooms which encourage student engagement in STEM learning. As with previous years, we continue to focus on student agency, where students work with their teachers to identify where their learning is currently sits, what the next steps in their learning are and setting realistic goals to progress their learning.

Handwriting



The development of handwriting is not a linear process that all children must follow. Rather children will experiment with scribbling, early drawings and explore written language before they develop into competent hand writers. All children travel their own writing journeys and meet different milestones at different times. But if we want young children to write, they need to see adults and older children write and need to be provided with resources to explore the writing process. This could include pencils and paper, crayons or chalk. Paint brushes and water are a great way of exploring mark making on pavements.





Pencil grip is just one part of handwriting and most children will naturally develop a grip that is comfortable for them. The recommended grip and paper

orientation is illustrated in these images. A poor pencil grip may become a habit and be hard to change in later years. This can lead to slow and illegible writing and discomfort when writing longer texts.

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Children's University



East Torrens will once again be participating in the Children's University led by the Adelaide University. Although the program is available for students who are 5-14 years old, we are offering the program for students in Year 3-6 only.

The Children's University allows students to receive hours for learning completed outside of school as well as lunchtime and after school. There are also online activities that students can complete and places to visit if families are interested. Some of these are at a cost.

The cost of the program is \$16.50 for each child. This fee covers the passport children receive to record the hours they have completed and also gives them access to an online portal which has many different learning opportunities they can access including some of which are free of charge. It also covers the cost of the graduation ceremony that students participate in if they achieve a minimum of 30 hours or more. If students are continuing from last year, they are still required to pay the membership for this year. A further payment of \$7.70 will be required by students who have participated before and have lost their passport.

If your children are interested in becoming members of the Children's University for 2025, click on the QR code and it will take you to the registration page. Registrations and payment will be due by **Friday the 28^{th d} of March** (Week 9).


PLAYGROUP
